Wise Responds to Invasion of Ukraine with Massive Fundraising Effort

Over three weeks this spring, the combined effort of Stephen

Wise Temple and Schools and Short Hills, N.J.'s Congregation B'nai Jeshurun raised over \$500,000 to help refugees from Russia's invasion of Ukraine. Included in these donations were proceeds from cookie sales that were donated by Wise Girl Scout Troops 71925 and 71895.

Moldova, full of medical supplies, medics, and equipment for

field hospitals. On the return flight, those same planes transport refugees to safety in Israel.

The fundraising effort's initial goal was to fund one such flight. That flight—carrying 147 Ukrainian refugees—landed at Ben-Gurion Airport in Israel on April 1.

The ongoing campaign now funds planes full of supplies and food for victims of the Russian invasion.

HEALING THE WORLD

Susan Bloch-Kay & Stephen Kay

hen Susan Bloch-Kay and Stephen Kay moved from New York to Los Angeles in 2003 they had few roots, little history, and few friends and family in L.A. Most pressing: They didn't know where they would send their three sons to school. One couple they knew had two children in Wise Schools, and were Stephen Wise Temple members. "We have

your one-stop shop," they told the Kays.

While they began as Wise School parents, the Kays' involvement has branched into community outreach, adult learning, and tikkun olam efforts, as they have enthusiastically immersed themselves in nearly everything Wise has to offer.

"Wise is not just our connection to Judaism," says Stephen. "It's part of our connection to the broader community."

Susan—the daughter of a longtime Jewish

educator—wanted to get involved immediately. As soon as her two younger sons entered Wise School, Susan became active in the Wise Parents Association. Whether it was serving on the WPA's Tikkun Olam Committee, recruiting Mitzvah Day participants, raising funds for Beit Issie Shapiro School in Israel, or packing and driving SOVA donations to the food pantry,

Susan was "always the first to have her hand up," says longtime temple board member and past WPA president Joyce Anderson.

Sharing Rabbi Ron Stern's passion for tikkun olam, Susan accepted an invitation to a 2011 informational meeting on the Fulfillment Fund at the

home of its founder, Wise member Dr. Gary Gitnick (z"l). The Fund uses mentorship as a vehicle to make college a reality for students growing up in underserved communities. The day after that meeting, she signed up to start her mentor training and has since recruited over 20 Wise members to join her. "I feel like I made a difference in the lives of 20 kids by bringing in mentors who took them all the way through college," says Susan, who is

still close with her mentee, now a U.C. San Diego graduate.

When their sons went off to college, the couple looked for an activity they could do together and found Wise's Melton School for Adult Jewish Learning. For many years, they happily volunteered to host "Sukkot In Your Neighborhood" events

> in their backyard, and Stephen became involved with Wise Guys, attending dinners and events, including a brewery tour. Many of their closest friends in Los Angeles are also temple members. "There's so much for adults of all ages, including those who are empty nesters," Susan says.

As the Wise clergy shepherded the family through lifecycle events-including the b'nai mitzvah of their sons Jesse and Julian, their son Aaron's wedding to Wise alumna

Julian Kay, Jesse Kay, Christy Cholla, Aaron Kay, Lyndsay Nevins, Susan Bloch-Kay, and Stephen Kay have availed themselves of all Wise has to offer.

Lyndsay Nevins and the naming of Aaron and Lyndsay's baby girl Poppy—Susan and Stephen marveled at how the Wise clergy were able to balance the needs of their community with world events.

"The temple provided us a connection to a broader response

to what's happening in the world," says Stephen, who will be joining the temple's Board of Directors in July. "It provides us with a pathway for engagement."

DISCOVERING A JEWISH EDUCATION

Philip & Hedyeh Shaoul and Family

hen Wise School fifth grade teacher Mary Itri looked at Brooke Shaoul, she saw potential in the introverted student.

In charge of the annual spring musical, Itri—legendary for knowing just how to inspire each individual pupil—encouraged Brooke to try out. Performing in that year's production of "Peter Pan" proved to be the spark Brooke needed. She ran for fifth grade class president and won, got involved with the debate team, and was elected secretary of the entire student body in sixth grade. In her first year at Brentwood School, Brooke served on the student council.

Brooke's transformational experience is one of the many reasons why Brooke's bicoastal parents—Philip and Hedyeh—chose Wise when they moved the family to Los Angeles eight years ago, while Philip split his time between New York and L.A. Since then, the Shaoul family's journey at Wise has been one of community, service, and celebration.

"The Judaism side of the school, connecting with the temple, we've had that in the New York community in various forms," says Philip, "but Wise just feels like home, when you have both those two worlds connected in such a seamless way."

Philip was just 5 in 1972 when he moved from Iran to New York by way of Israel with his parents and sister. The local Chabad shaped his Jewish experience. When Hedyeh and her family moved from Iran to Santa Monica (also by way of Israel) in 1978, her formal Jewish education came at Sinai Temple's thrice-weekly religious school.

After the two married, Hedyeh fell in love with the Jewish day schools she saw as she and Philip started their family in New York. When Hedyeh first returned to her roots in Los Angeles

after eight years, she was pregnant with their third child Blake and looking for a Jewish day school where students learned to connect strongly with their Jewish values and heritage. She visited several schools, but couldn't find the right fit.

"When I called all of my friends, everyone said that they felt a sense of connectedness with Stephen Wise," says Hedyeh. "When I toured Stephen Wise and I saw the campus, I said, 'Oh, my God, this is going to be the place for us."

They enrolled Brooke in kindergarten, then younger sister Lola, and then baby brother Blake. Throughout her family's time at Wise, Hedyeh has served as room parent for each of her

children, class historian for each grade, and the Co-Chair of the Wise School Ambassadors, working closely with Head of School Tami Weiser.

"I went from, in the beginning, not knowing anything, to being fully in the trenches," Hedyeh says.

As his wife quickly became a mainstay in the Wise School community, Philip built a new circle of friends with fellow parents through social and family events.

Beyond the social and educational facets of their Wise experience, the Shaouls have found in Wise a reflection of their own relationships, both with one another and with Judaism.

"I love the way we practice our Judaism at Wise," Philip says. "It's so embracing of all the beauty of Judaism."

BUILDING A COMMUNITY

Susan Firestone

hen a Stephen Wise community member gets a Wise Hearts care package as they recover from an illness, they'll often find small scraps of paper slipped in, bearing words of wisdom.

Poems, quotes, stories, photocopied writings of Mother Teresa, and even handwritten motivational messages find their way into

nearly every package Susan Firestone has assembled for almost two decades.

"People here know me for writing the notes," she says. "I always include things like this."

A Wise member for 38 years, Susan has touched nearly every aspect of temple life, finding fulfillment in service. From greeting worshippers at High Holy Day services to serving on a variety of committees to sorting donated clothing, her membership has been defined by her dedication to the Wise community.

"Stephen Wise Temple is like my second home," Susan says.

After moving to the United States in 1967, the Northwest Londoner eventually settled in Encino. After her daughter Laura became a bat mitzvah at the temple down the street from their home, Susan found she had little other connection to that

community. In 1984, she joined Stephen Wise Temple, where, for more than 15 years, she was a typical member of the congregation.

Ron Stern. His focus on *tikkun olam* (repairing the world) struck a chord. She'd found a purpose. She could practice *tikkun olam* by helping to build and care for the Wise community. "I knew I could *do* something," Susan says.

She wound up doing quite a lot. Susan went with temple members to Los Angeles County Hospital, assembling and

packing sandwiches to serve to patients with AIDS. She made calls to call new temple members before High Holy Days, encouraging them to attend services. She has stuffed envelopes, sorted clothes donated for Mitzvah Day, and served on the membership, Wise Years, and Wise Hearts committees.

Susan has also participated in the wide range of learning opportunities at Wise, including the Melton School of Adult Jewish Learning. "I love it, I love the teachers, I

> love that we make friends with each other," says Susan, whose greatest joy is getting to know the people in the community.

She is a regular at Center for Jewish Life events, serves each year as a High Holy Day greeter, and has been a fixture at Kabbalat Shabbat. Before the pandemic, Rabbi David Woznica would pass by Susan setting up

for Kabbalat Shabbat on the way to his office on Friday afternoons, and thank her.

Then, she heard the very first sermon given at Wise by Rabbi

"Please don't thank me," she would say. "I should thank you for letting me do this."

Patrick & Afsoun Kann and Family

hen Patrick Kann visited his family home in Brazil during a break from Stanford Business School, he brought an unexpected guest: a woman named Afsoun, whom he'd been dating only a couple short weeks.

The visit was neither scary nor awkward for Afsoun. For the Iranian transplant who grew up in Nashville, that home in Brazil felt somehow familiar, even comfortable.

"I felt like I was meeting my family," she says. "I knew then that we were going to get married."

Seven years later, after moving to Los Angeles with two children and another on the way, both Patrick and Afsoun felt that same comfort when they visited Wise School for the first time. Since then, whatever their individual educational, social, or spiritual needs have been, each member of the Kann family has found their fit at Wise.

When their youngest child Levi was born, Wise Hearts sent a care package with a teddy bear, and Rabbi Yoshi helped the Kanns find a mohel. As they juggled three children with two full-time careers—Afsoun a Disney executive and Patrick a tech startup CEO—the Kanns received help from Wise School parents who helped with carpooling and other logistics.

With Tali (12) and Levi (6) in Wise School, Wise's Center for Youth Engagement (CYE) has become middle child Gabriella's Jewish home.

"I used to go to Sunday school says. "I didn't learn anything,

kicking and screaming," Afsoun and I didn't necessarily get the essence and meaning of it all. In

the CYE, with family camp, family learning experiences, Camp Wise on the weekend once a month, and summers at Camp Wise, they form these personal connections."

The madrichim (teen leaders) became like older cousins for Gabriella and older sister Tali, who has gone to Wise School since kindergarten. They talk incessantly about their favorite counselor Jake. When Afsoun and Patrick showed up for family camp for the first time, they arrived late, but instead of a frantic scramble, they found the calm, warm, and welcoming Tatiana Soofer, Director of Camp Wise and Youth Programming.

"My kids are running up to her and hugging her," Afsoun says. "They knew her because they had been going to after-school, and again, it just felt like family."

This year, Levi started at Wise School and began attending Camp Wise Sundays.

Says Afsoun: "I feel like Wise is our partner and our guide and our village, to really help us ensure that we're raising these children with an understanding of their heritage, their culture, and their religion, and doing it in a way that's completely adaptable to whatever works for our family."

WISE SCHOOL

t Wise School, every student has the opportunity to learn deeply, be creative, experience wholeness and make great happen—and they really do! These are not platitudes on banners; we see them play out every day. We see them in the 618 speaker points won by our fifth and sixth grade debaters in their last tournament, in the 72 3-point baskets scored by our fourth, fifth, and sixth grade athletes during the winter intramural season, in the 5,200 sight words learned by our kindergarten students, and in the 1,100 family members who attended grade-level Friday night Shabbat services. This year our school theme was "Nivrah B'Tzelem-Our Creativity is Godly," and we saw this theme play out in our Tyberg Art & Innovation Lab, in our project studio, in our science lab, and in every classroom. Students demonstrated creativity in their Daughters of the American Revolution essays, during debate tournaments, in our STEAM Day, in bringing an Odyssey of the Mind championship to Wise, and in so many other ways. Our parents, too, demonstrated creativity by finding ways to connect both in-person and online.

That same creative spirit—embodied by the efforts of our incredible teachers and staff—is what has helped our school community thrive during a difficult two years. It fueled our drive for accreditation from the Western Association of Schools & Colleges (WASC), the industry standard for elementary and secondary schools in California.

The visiting WASC Accreditation team acknowledged many strengths of our school, including the amazing teaching staff, strong relationships of our administration, the fantastic campus facilities, our supportive parents, and of course our high-level general and Judaic Studies/Hebrew curriculum.

They witnessed firsthand how students and families embody our core principles with their creativity, critical thinking, and dedication to community, and awarded Wise School the highest level of accreditation WASC can grant, cementing our position among private schools both Jewish and secular.

AARON MILKEN CENTER

very day is a new opportunity in our Aaron Milken Center (AMC). Our youngest students use our beautiful campus as their learning environment and can often be found taking a nature hike as they gather materials for a classroom project.

Based on the philosophy of emergent curriculum, our AMC teachers take on the role of the facilitator, using what they see and hear amongst their learners to create experiences for children to explore, discover, and construct new knowledge and skills through their play.

Take, for example, our tradition of apples and honey on Rosh Hashanah. In one classroom, a discussion of this sweet start to the new year developed into an exploration of beehives. Wrapping academic learning into the natural play and curiosity of their students' development, the teachers were able to introduce concepts like hexagons, simple math problems, and drawing. For the children, this was a natural extension of the play they were already enjoying; for their teachers (and parents), it allowed the introduction of age-appropriate academic skills like pre-writing.

A core tenet of AMC is that the children form a deep connection to Judaism. That connection is evident in the weekly Shabbat services, wonderful holiday celebrations, and daily prayers. We practice Jewish values daily as children learn social and emotional skills, and for our Hebrew Immersion classrooms, they do it all in Hebrew!

Weeks at Aaron Milken Center are filled with specialists: Yoga, music, P.E., and StorahTime with our rabbis are all part of the fun and the learning. Our remarkable atelierista Joanne Wolmarans

is a key component of the curriculum, guiding our AMC students as they explore different art media, from loose parts to clay to paint and more. Guided by both the emergent curriculum and the richness of Jewish symbols like the *hamsa* or *mezuzah*, our young artists are focused, creative, and deeply proud of both the art they create and of the creative process.

Our AMC parents are also growing, both in their own education and as a community. It is joyful to see parents on campus, whether they are serving as Shabbat *Abba* or *Ema* or attending our social events, and we cannot wait to see our parents on campus even more next year.

his year, our Center for Youth Engagement (CYE) introduced groundbreaking new ways for our students to learn and experience Judaism. Using creative thinking and strategic partnerships, we provided families with options that enabled them to control the focus, frequency, and format of their children's Jewish education. Our K-6 families enjoyed four choices for Judaic studies and two for prayer studies, enabling them to tailor their experience to fit their children's learning style and their family's schedule.

Some students experienced the fun of our monthly Camp Wise Sundays, which let them practice Jewish values on the sports field, in the art studio, and in the pool. Others discovered the rich meaning behind our Jewish calendar at our monthly Family Learning Experience, which offered engaging and meaningful experiential learning for the family as a whole. Some embraced our tradition's ancient teachings at weekly Shabbat Torah study. Others discovered the joys of Judaism through class, prayer, art, and gardening at our weekly religious school partnership with Leo Baeck Temple. Still others mastered Hebrew and the meaning and modes of Jewish prayer in our T'filah Tuesdays and individual iLearn programs.

Our Wise Temple Youth (WTY) teens made meaning by teaching in our programs and by gathering for experiences of joy, community, and learning. With a vibrant teen community dedicated to acceptance and growth, WTY offered our teens a chance for meaningful respite and friendship.

ummer 2021 marked Wise Readers to Leaders' 10th year in operation, as we welcomed back nearly 150 students to in-person programming and an additional 100 through a virtual summer program.

Students were excited to engage once again in high-quality literacy and enrichment programming through both formats, but their academic loss and emotional challenges due to the COVID-19 pandemic were evident. A special partnership with the Maple Counseling Center provided WRTL scholars with professional mental health counselors to assist with these challenges.

We also continued to offer year-round programs, engaging over 250 students. Our Teen Board of 26 high school students supported each of our programs, providing individualized support to our scholars, which enabled them to catch up in the specific ways each one needed.

One of the most exciting parts of this past summer was having eight former scholars return as Junior Literacy Leaders (JLLs), our high-school-aged teaching assistants. After graduating our program, these JLLs were inspired to serve their community as they were once served.

As further support, Wise Readers to Leaders is pleased to offer a new College Access Program in partnership with the Fulfillment Fund, providing college information workshops and one-on-one college advisors for seniors.

While we lit the first candle of Hanukkah together over Zoom, our Wise School first grade students brought extra joy to our in-person Shabbanukah celebration, as did the fun lights and delicious *sufganiyot*. Tu B'Shevat brought us out on the trails, over 1,000 people attended our Super Purim Carnival (see next page), and we were thrilled to welcome our community *seder* back in person! The Greater Zion Church Family joined us for Shavuot learning and fellowship, and our community came together—across campus and across screens—for each and every Shabbat.



We continue to meet the challenge of living in this hybrid world through technology, but also through deep connections and relationships built across time and space.

As the 2022 High Holy Days approach, we are ready to once again offer multi-access experiences, including both in-person and online options. hen Stephen Wise Temple elevated Cantor Emma Lutz to the post of Senior Cantor on Friday, March 25, 2022, we made history.

For the first time in our 58 years, a woman now holds this title and role. Installed at just 34, Cantor Emma also became one of the youngest senior cantors in the country.

"Emma Lutz is one of the shining lights of new and creative cantorial talents," said Andrea Sonnenberg, one of the cochairs of the transition committee that tapped Cantor Emma as Wise's senior musical voice. "This was not a hard choice. Cantor Emma's energy, experience in multiple musical genres, creativity, learning, and cantorial talents make her a perfect fit for the Stephen Wise community and Jewish L.A."

The service in Katz Family Pavilion was filled with layered musical meaning, a tribute to how Cantor Emma has shaped Wise worship in her six years at the synagogue. In partnership with beloved Music Director Maestro David Kates, Cantor

Emma's voice and soul shone through liturgy old and new. 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


