No Place like HOME A Message from Rabbi Yoshi Zweiback

his summer, for a few glorious weeks, Jacqueline and I had all three of our daughters back with us under one roof. We shared meals together, went out for comedy and live music, took family walks and hikes, and joined the masses in actually sitting in a movie theater for what came to be called "Barbenheimer" in the press.

As I reflected on how wonderful it all felt, I found myself thinking about an iconic moment in a different film, *The Wizard of Oz.* (Not the scary scene with the flying monkeys that haunted my childhood but the one where Dorothy clicks her heels three times and says, "There's no place like home!").

What makes the concept of home so special, for me at least, are the feelings that "home" evokes: safety, love, a sense of belonging, of feeling seen and known.

As I reflect on Dorothy's wish, I wonder how accurate it really is. I think actually that there are quite a few places—at least in my life experience—that are like home.

When I was a kid, home was the Jewish summer camp where I made lifelong friends and where I felt cared for and loved. In college, I found a sense of home at Hillel. And I have been blessed to feel at home in synagogues around the world: in Omaha, Jerusalem, Los Altos Hills, and—of course right here in Los Angeles.

It is our hope, and at the heart of all we do, that Wise be a place that feels like home to our community: A place where we feel safe and cared for, heard and seen; a place where we find comfort and meaning through the teachings of our tradition and through the friendships we have made. While you might not be able to click your heels through the traffic on the 405, we want you to feel calm and whole each time you turn onto Stephen S. Wise Drive.

After the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem almost 2,000 years ago, our

ancient sages were bereft and unrooted, looking for a new spiritual home, a place to feel calm and whole. This is the reason that they began to call the synagogue a Beit Knesset—a home for gathering. Perhaps even more than prayer, more than learning, our synagogue—our temple and school buildings and community—is supposed to feel like a home to us all, members and guests alike.

Sometimes creating that sense of home takes work on our part. When our daughters came back for the summer, we had to make space for them, both physically and emotionally.

To make this place our spiritual home requires some effort as well. We have to show up for our community, bringing our full selves and opening our hearts to one another so that everyone—including ourselves—will feel *ba'bayit*, at home. Let's welcome each other more, share more Shabbat dinners and simchas with each other, listen harder and better, hug more, celebrate more, support each other more. Let's work together to make sure that everyone feels seen and known.

The world is filled with great beauty and, yes, sometimes with scary moments as well. Thank goodness that there are also many homes—many sanctuaries—where we can feel safe and loved and seen. Places where we can feel calm and whole in a world that is anything but. Places where we can find and make—meaning and purpose and, together as God's partners, make the world a better place, too.

Dr. Tali Tadmor Music Director for Stephen Wise Temple and Schools



Our music director Dr. Tali Tadmor, DMA, is a leader in the field of Jewish worship music. Born and raised in Israel, she combines a deep understanding of Hebrew texts with her musical talents. Tali was Music Director at Temple Judea for 22 years and is on faculty at the Academy of Jewish Religion, California (AJR-CA), where she helps to train future generations of cantors. This past year, Tali was commissioned to compose piano arrangements for the Reform Movement's newest anthology of High Holy Day music. In addition to her work in the Jewish world, she has a career in classical music: For several years she served as Assistant Music Director at the LA. Opera and has performed in venues including Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, and around the globe. Tali holds master's and doctorate degrees in music performance from USC.

Cantor Tannoz Bahremand Foruzanfar was born in Tehran, Iran, and moved to Los Angeles with her family when she was two years old. An only child, her favorite hobby was always singing. She attended USC, where she earned her bachelor's in education with an emphasis in Music. She received a master's in sacred music at the AJR-CA and was ordained in 2009 as the first female Iranian-American cantor. Tannoz began working at Stephen Wise Temple in the summer of 2004.

Andrew became our Cantorial Intern in July of 2022, but he was part of our musical team even before that. Andrew sings and chants at services, lends his voice and guitar to **Aaron Milken Center** Shabbats, works with our **Center for Youth Engagement (CYE)**, and heads up our **Young Adult Division (YAD)**.

Originally from Huntington Beach, Andrew was passionate about Jewish music from an early age, singing in his synagogue's High Holy Day choir at the age of 10. Andrew has a background in musical theater, performing in New York for six years before returning to Southern California in 2020.

Andrew is currently in his third year of cantorial school at the AJR-CA in Los Angeles.



Spend the Day Learning With Us on Yom Kippur

Our clergy and musical team have created space for our community to learn, pray, reflect, and engage with our tradition in a variety of ways during the afternoon of Yom Kippur.

Many undertake a fast during Yom Kippur, abstaining from food and drink so as to focus body and soul on the task of *teshuvah*. Helping center us on the themes of repentance and reflection, it is a common practice to spend most of the hours of the day in synagogue.

While prayer is a central aspect of the Yom Kippur day, the prophet Isaiah reminds us that prayer without action and introspection is not a true fast. So, what better way to spend the fast than by drinking in the ancient words of our tradition, filling ourselves with knowledge and wisdom, and sharing the nourishment of our text—and its commitment to action—through lively discussion? Join us for what promises to be a moving and inspiring afternoon. All study sessions will be held in-person with a Zoom option.



Building for Tomorrow: Aaron Milken Center

s 5783 began just one year ago, we were preparing to break ground on Aaron Milken Center, our transformational new early childhood education building. What a difference a year can make!

Over the last 12 months, our mountaintop has been transformed. Our entire community came together to celebrate our groundbreaking ceremony with joyous singing and champagne toasts. Those who visited campus during the winter and spring saw piles of rubble and dirt behind our construction fence as the site was cleared (with some help from Rabbi Yoshi and Tami Weiser on the frontloader) and graded.

In May, the enormous cisterns—which will play a major role in AMC's sustainability profile by collecting runoff water—were lowered into the ground. In June, the hillside retaining wall was built. In July, the foundations for our new buildings were laid, and in August, the masonry walls began to rise.

As you arrived on campus for High Holy Day services this year, you saw the interior walls for the first floor being installed, and the structural beams and columns for the second floor being put into place. Later this

fall, we'll celebrate a major milestone that those in the construction business call "topping out"—when the

tallest and last beam of a building is set into place.

canopy that will give shade to our sprawling community plaza, the project will have reached an unofficial midway point.

Over the next 11 months, the signature features which all make our new AMC a state-of-the-art educational vanguard will be added, including spaces that weave sustainability into the backdrop for childhood imagination and play.

Built to LEED Silver standards for sustainability, our new buildings will reduce energy and water waste while creating healthy spaces. Our youngest learners and their families will behold our beautiful surroundings from our age-appropriate playgrounds, our water-filtering Rain Garden, and from any one of four rooftop learning gardens. These spaces are a key component of AMC's green architecture and will introduce our students to growing food, sensory play, and the natural world around them.

Watching construction of our new buildings every day, it's easy to look forward to next fall, but I'm most excited to spend the year educating children, supporting families, and celebrating this community.

As children return to campus, they find classroom environments rich with materials that provoke questions about Rosh Hashanah, and they begin to recognize the symbols, sounds, smells, and tastes of the holiday.

A big part of our curriculum is introducing Jewish values and creating opportunities for children to practice them. By opening up a *rimon*—Hebrew for pomegranate, the fruit most often associated with Rosh Hashanah—children ask about the hundreds of seeds they contain.

As they learn that these seeds have come to represent *mitzvot*—commandments—they learn the blessing that asks God for help in making our good deeds as numerous as those seeds.

Over the next seven months, our children will continue to investigate our traditions and the world around them even more. They will ask new questions, and new lessons will emerge from their insatiable curiosity.

One of our blessings, especially with our youngest learners, is that we are given a fresh start every day. We are given the chance to do and see things a little differently and the opportunity to be even more grateful than we were the day before. At AMC, every day is a chance to refresh, renew, and reimagine.

A long with the targeted ads from Facebook and Instagram, I have long believed that my iTunes library can read my mood. True or not, it often seems like the shuffle mode can tell

these holy days is *teshuvah*—a turning—a return to that feeling of wholeness and safety that Rabbi Yoshi wrote about.

But millenia before Sally Fingerett OR Peter, Paul, and Mary sang, our Torah taught about building not just a physical space, but a sense of connection—a spiritual home. V'asu li mikdash, we read in the Book of Exodus; God commands the Israelites: "Build me a sacred space." Build me, God says, something physical, something I can see and feel and touch, somewhere I can go to feel whole and safe. But the verse does not end there, and neither can we. V'shachanti b'tocham—"Build me a sacred space," God says, "and I will dwell amongst You." Do the work of building—space, time, community and you will feel Divine presence.

These pages, these days, this time of year they are together an invitation into that work. Each page, each service, each microcommunity, each event, each gathering—is an offering of sacred space and sacred time; you are invited to join us, to build this with us. And, no matter how you connect, with each moment you spend and each person you meet, it is our sincere hope and belief that you will create a space for the Divine to dwell with us, blessing us and helping us grow. Join us, and let your heart—and soul feel a little more at home.





Our candlesticks, *kippot, mezuzot*, and more hide in plain sight, but how often do we really think about them? Building on your previous knowledge, this course explores the Jewish objects that are so familiar to us and uncovers how little we know about them.

We will take a deep dive into what they are and what they mean, sharing our own stories, memories, and the objects we own into dialogue with the texts of our tradition. The current friction often felt between Muslims and Jews was not always the norm throughout history. Following the emergence of Islam, it was far better to be Jewish in a Muslim country than in a Christian one, and often, people of both faiths have found ways to coexist peacefully and productively. In this course, we'll delve into this history and prior periods of enmity to gain a more nuanced perspective. We will examine the commonalities between Jewish and Islamic culture, as well as the sources of tension between these two monotheistic communities, challenging our assumptions and broadening our understanding.

to uncover the diverse and complex faces of Jewish Israeli identity. The course provides a historic overview of the early Zionist vision, the emergence of the New Jew, and the institutions that shaped the country, providing insights into how Israeli society today reflects the dreams, aspirations, and endeavors of those who settled the Land of Israel. The course examines themes including the evolving religious landscape, the intricate relationship of politics and religion, the interplay of Mizrachi and Ashkenazi Jews, the dynamic between Israel and world Jewry, and Jewish Renaissance agents in Israel.

Leonard Cohen imprinted our world with his astonishing body of poetry, prose, and music. At once a loner and legendary lover, and adored by so many in life, his star has risen even higher since his passing in 2016. Cohen explored many religious and spiritual paths throughout his life, but his loyalty to his Jewish heritage never faltered. 36 Bouquets for Wise

Mario M. Muller

Stephen Wise Temple & Schools Artist-In-Residence

Mario M. Muller is Stephen Wise Temple & Schools' Artist-in-Residence. His art appears all over our campus and in our High Holy Day Machzor, Sha'ar HaShamayim. Each year, Mario decorates our campus with banners featuring his striking use of contrast and shadow. As you explore our mountaintop during these Days of Awe, you will be greeted by Mario's newest project, celebrating our community's upcoming 60th anniversary. omposing 36 images for the banner installation is always a bit of a bouillabaisse of creativity. This year was no different.

Seven months ago, I had already started to experiment with certain themes and visual extravagances for the fifth incarnation of what has become the annual banner project. Above all else, my goal was to acknowledge the 60th anniversary of the temple.

Working, as I do, almost exclusively in black and white, I decided to surprise everyone by making the compositions gregariously colorful. I started harvesting images of flowers from all over Los Angeles. I was omnivorous when it came to color, texture, and fragrance. But making a simple arrangement was not nearly enough. I turned to puzzle pieces and the patterns that they create when assembled.

I've had a longstanding fascination with puzzles. As a kid I would tear through 1,000- and 1,500-piece puzzles with focused determination and speed. My son Wolfgang has the same patience and mad skills.

In the mid-1990s, with my career only a decade old, I composed several variations of puzzle shapes that, when multiplied and duplicated, would fit into each other endlessly. A new era of research was dawning with the mapping of the human genome. I was riveted. A tessellated fabric became a rich metaphor for the shared molecules of DNA that bind humanity together. The foundational pieces are identical, but through combinations and permutations, a rich tapestry of limitless variety is generated.

Lightning struck. I married the two inspirations. Each puzzle piece was to be adorned by one flower. Assemble in different scales and repeat. Assemble and repeat. Thirty-six variations, each with a distinct flavor. Each with an implied aroma. Well over 1,000 shapes woven into a rich fabric.

The result is a series of conceptual bouquets that will "bloom" all year long. The endless variation of pattern and rhythm is a metaphor for the limitless resilience of Judaism. They will not only acknowledge our successes but also announce our ambitions. Each flower, each shape indexes each member of our community. Each bouquet, in turn, celebrates the congregation as a whole that is indeed greater than the sum of the parts.


